6.1 Te Arawa 2050 Vision Committee Project Feedback

1. TE PŪTAKE PURPOSE

To provide Te Arawa 2050 Vision Committee directions for the inaugural meeting.

2. HE TŪTOHUNGA RECOMMENDATION

3. TE TĀHUHU BACKGROUND

In 2015, Te Arawa and the Rotorua Lakes Council recognised the need for a new working relationship to achieve positive community outcomes. After extensive consultation, they adopted the Te Arawa Partnership, which is a long-term, evolving relationship that can be reviewed and amended as necessary. On 31 May 2023, the Terms of Reference for a working party to review the Partnership were approved, and representatives from the Council and Te Tatau were appointed. The review was independently facilitated by Leo Watson, and the findings were presented to Council on 25 September 2024. Further discussions, supported by Te Tatau and Te Amorangi staff, helped refine the terms of reference.

In December 2024 the Rotorua Lakes Council delegated to the newly established 'Te Arawa 2050 Vision Committee' the ability to provide support to a maximum of 5 key projects that intersect with the Te Arawa 2050 Vision (Attachment 1 – distributed separately) and the Rotorua Lakes Council Community Outcomes work programme.

The Committee's delegations (Attachment 2 – distributed separately), as prescribed by Rotorua Lakes Council, set out that the Committee is responsible for ensuring meaningful engagement with Te Arawa Whānui and others on the key projects. As well as receiving project progress, risks and mitigations on the projects to ensure accountability. If required, the Committee will also provide support to the projects' effective implementation and risk management.

4. TE MATAPAKI ME NGĀ KŌWHIRINGA DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS

This report seeks Committee feedback on projects that align with the Te Arawa 2050 Vision and within the Council work programme so that the Committee can make a subsequent decision to adopt up to five projects for the remainder of 2025. The report requests staff to bring back a further report to the next Committee meeting providing a detailed assessment of the project(s) and addressing any feedback received from the Committee.

It is recommended that the Committee limit the number of projects for 2025, as there are only 4 meetings scheduled for 2025, before the next triennium.

1. TE PŪTAKE PURPOSE

3. TE TĀHUHU BACKGROUND

The Chief Executive must give notice in writing to each member of the time and place of a meeting as required by the Local Government Act 2002 (LGA 2002) and the Local Government Official Information and Meeting Act 1987 (LGOIMA). If a local authority adopts a schedule of meetings, the schedule may cover any future period that the local authority considers appropriate and may be amended. Notification of the schedule, or any amendment, constitutes a notification of every meeting.

The approval of a meetings calendar also provides the ability for councillors, Te Tatau o Te Arawa board members, executive team and leadership team to structure future issues for decision-making.

The calendar also ensures that statutory timeframes are met in terms of adoption of annual plans, annual reports etc.
